North Tarryall Creek Project Monitoring Hike National Public Lands Day Saturday, September 28, 9:00 AM - 3:00 PM

Join us as we revisit our 2018 restoration project site at the headwaters of the North Tarryall Creek in South Park, just west of Boreas Pass Road. We will monitor for revegetation of the project site and illegal motorized use. The 5-6 mile round trip hike has approximately 900 feet of elevation gain, taking us just beneath the Continental Divide!

There will be optional camping the night before at the Selkirk Campground, home of our 2016 restoration project site and just below where our N. Tarryall Creek monitoring hike will begin.

Volunteer Seeding Restoration Project at the FS Puma Hills Roadless Area Saturday, October 5, 9:00 AM - 3:00 PM

Wild Connections is excited to partner once again with the USFS' South Park Ranger District. We will be closing about two and a half miles of illegal motorized routes that enter the Puma Hills Roadless Area just north of Elevenmile Canyon Reservoir.

The FS will be prepping the area for us, where we will seed and rake two large sections of illegal routes, stemming from adjacent BLM public lands. The FS will rewire the boundary fence and install signs to keep out illegal motorized use in the future.

Beaver Creek Climate Educational Hike Saturday, October 12, 8:00 AM - 4:00 PM

Join us for a hike into the wild Beaver Creek Wilderness Study Area, located between Colorado Springs and Cañon City, to retrieve data loggers that have been recording temperature and humidity data. Beaver Creek was identified as being on the of "Best" areas for Climate Refugia in Wild Connections Climate Corridor and Refugia Analysis.

This will be a strenuous hike of about 7.5 miles and 1,600 feet total ascent, rated strenuous for the distance, elevation gain, cliff-edged trails and creek crossings.

<u>FS Pike National Forest - Target Shooting Plan</u> Public Comments due September 4

On Aug 5, the Forest Service released their preliminary environmental assessment for their <u>Integrated Management of Target Shooting on the Pike National Forest</u>, which consists of the Forest Service's Pikes Peak, South Park, and South Platte Ranger Districts.

This project addresses the need for public target shooting opportunities on the forest, IDs areas that are unsuitable for dispersed target shooting as well as locations to develop shooting ranges.
