As part of Colorado Public Lands Day, May 17th, Wild Connections and the Pikes Peak Sierra Club Group invite you to join them for a cleanup of the Sierra Club's Adopt-A-Waterway section of Fountain Creek, adjacent to El Pomar Youth Sports Center along the Pikes Peak Greenway Trail in Colorado Springs.

This is an opportunity to help the environment and also learn more about our waterways and their importance to wildlife and to wildlife movement. Dress for the weather, including work gloves, long pants, and sturdy shoes or boots. Wear sunscreen and bring drinking water. Park in the northeast corner of the Kohl's parking lot at 2725 Janitell Rd, Colorado Springs, where we will meet for a short safety briefing and provide information on items that should not be picked up, but left for a special crew. **Pre-event registration is required. Pikes Peak Birding and Nature Festival May 15 - 18



<u>Sign up today</u> to attend the Pikes Peak Birding and Nature Festival! As the festival heads into 2025, birders can look forward to another amazing array of bird species. The festival motto is "prairie to peak" and it lives up to that billing.

Wild Connection's is sponsoring the festival and we will be celebrating with fellow bird and nature lovers at the festival's Birds, Bites & Brews social event on May 17 from 5:00-7:00 pm.

Spring migration along Colorado's Front Range is often full of surprises and the festival weekend is peak migration time. The Pikes Peak region has much to offer, with the short-grass prairie rising to meet the forested foothills and deep canyons of the southern Front Range, and rich, riparian forests providing for countless birds, insects, and other wildlife. The Pikes Peak Birding & Nature Festival can be very special for visitors and locals alike. They have recorded 10 out of 12 woodpecker species which regularly occur in Colorado. And there have been over 15 species of flycatchers and shorebirds, 20 species of sparrows, and that one lone White Ibis.
